2013 Fiscal Year in Review

(Oct. 1, 2012 - Sept. 30, 2013)

The SID Network of Ohio continues to offer programs and services to parents, professionals and the community to further our mission to promote infant safety in an effort to reduce the rate of SIDS and SUID. As we reach out across the state educating parents and caregivers on safe ways to sleep their babies, we are reminded of the startling statistic that 3 infant deaths each week in Ohio are sleep related. Many of these deaths are preventable and through education we hope to make a difference in our overall infant mortality rate which is currently ranked 48th worst in the country. Our efforts are ongoing and each and every one of our programs is vital in reducing the number of sudden unexpected infant deaths. To help scientists understand how and why babies are dying suddenly and unexpectedly we continue to support medical research. We also provide bereavement support services to those families who so desperately need it.



materials is essential as we educate parents and caregivers on the ways to sleep babies safely to reduce the risk of SIDS and to prevent accidental death from positional asphyxia, suffocation and overlay. During fiscal year 2013, the SID Network distributed 18,750 infant safe sleep t-shirts to 30 hospitals, health departments and agencies throughout the state. We are pleased to report that we distributed 4,000 more t-shirts than fiscal year 2012! This program is made possible largely through families who host fundraising events and small foundation grants. Over 41,267 "Keep your sleeping baby safe" brochures (an increase of approximately 6,800 over the previous year) were distributed statewide as part of our Infant Safe Sleep Program to various hospitals/agencies and at our trainings. These brochures are printed and shipped to us through an in-kind donation from Pampers®. In addition, 4,471 additional risk reduction and safe sleep materials were sent to our partners to further our mission of reducing and one day eliminating SIDS and sleep related infant death.

An important part of our mission is to send families who lose a baby suddenly and unexpectedly information on the grieving process and resources that can help them deal with the unimaginable grief they are facing after such a tragic loss. This fiscal year we sent out 188 bereavement packets to families.

Other grief materials including 22 books entitled, SIDS and Other Infant Death Survival Guide were sent to parents and caregivers at their request. Our parent support contacts throughout the state were available to talk with these families as well. Families have found our support group in Columbus to be invaluable as they navigate through their grief and talk with other families who have suffered the same tragedy. The Network also logged over 130 phone calls and emails requesting bereavement support. Our newsletter, Encouragements, is a bereavement resource for parents and professionals and it also contains up to date information on SIDS and SUID related issues. Approximately 1,225 newsletters were emailed to families and professionals.

The SID Network continues our partnership with

the Ohio Department of Health's Sudden Infant Death Program, Provision of Mandated Reporting and Bereavement Support. This relationship will continue as we were awarded the contract through June 2015. The purpose of this program is to receive reports of sudden unexpected infant deaths from county medical examiners/coroners; report these deaths to the local health departments; insure that the local health departments have resources for providing bereavement support and to serve as the state expert on SIDS. The SID Network received 214 infant death referrals from coroners this past fiscal year. Final diagnoses were received for 164 babies to date with 10 diagnosed as SIDS.

As part of our mission to promote infant health and wellness through community outreach and education and our partnership with the Ohio Department of Health, the SID Network held 3 training workshops throughout the state. The SIDS Risk Reduction and Infant Safe Sleep Educational Workshops focused on educating public health nurses, community health workers, social workers, counselors and daycare providers. We had 128 in attendance at these 3 hour workshops in Columbus, Middletown and Toledo.

The SID Network also sat on the planning committee, volunteered and was the Gold Sponsor for the first ever Summit County Infant Mortality Summit held on June 6, 2013 at the John S. Knight Center in Akron. Summit County Public Health (SCPH) in partnership with many community partners held this one day Summit to highlight the need for action to address Summit County's high infant mortality rate which is higher than the nationwide rate. The infant mortality rate in the United States is 6.9 deaths per 1,000 live births, while it is 7.2 deaths per 1,000 births in Summit County. The rates among African-American mothers: 13.6 deaths per 1,000 live births in the U.S., compared to 14 deaths per 1,000 live births in Summit County, according to data from SCPH. Over 350 professionals, leaders and concerned community members attended the conference. Plans are in place to develop ways to decrease the numbers of babies who die before their first birthday.

Angelcare Recalls to Repair Movement and Sound Baby Monitors After Two Deaths Due to Strangulation Hazard

CPSC - November 21, 2013, Recall #14-028



Description

WASHINGTON, D.C. – The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC), in cooperation with Angelcare Monitors Inc.®, of Quebec, Canada, is announcing a voluntary recall to provide cord covers for 600,000 Angelcare Movement and Sound Monitors with Sensor Pads. The cord attached to the baby monitor's sensor pad is placed under the crib mattress, which poses a strangulation risk if the child pulls the cord into the crib and it becomes wrapped around the neck.

Angelcare and CPSC have received reports of two infant cord strangulation deaths. In November 2011, a 13-month-old female died in San Diego, California, and, in August 2004, an 8-month-old female died in Salem, Oregon. In both fatalities, the cord from the sensor pads was pulled into the crib by the infant. In addition, there have been two reports of infants who became entangled in cords of Angelcare baby monitor models, which did not result in fatalities. In these incidents, it could not be determined if the "sensor pad cord" or the "monitor cord" was involved in the incident.

The recall involves the Movement and Sound Monitor manufactured by Angelcare. This design of baby monitor includes a unique sensor pad placed inside the crib, under the mattress, to monitor movement of the baby. An electrical cord about 11 feet long is permanently connected from the sensor pad to the nursery monitor unit. The hazard is created by a cord within reach of a baby inside the crib. The cord can be pulled into the crib and can wrap around the child's neck. The recall involves all versions of Angelcare sensor monitors including model numbers: AC1100, AC201, AC300, AC401 AC601 and 49255 that did not include rigid cord covers, offered in the remedy. The model number is located on the back of the nursery monitor unit. The monitors were manufactured between 1999 and 2013.

Angelcare is providing consumers with a repair kit that includes rigid protective cord covers through which the sensor pad cords can be threaded, a new, permanent electric cord warning label about the strangulation risk, and revised instructions.

The recalled baby monitors were sold at Babies R Us/Toys R Us, Burlington Coat Factory, Meijer, Sears, Walmart, Amazon.com, Target.com, Overstock.com, and nearly 70 small baby specialty stores, from October 1999 through September 2013 for about \$100to \$300.

Consumers should immediately make sure cords are placed out of reach of the child and contact Angelcare toll-free at (855)355-2643 between 8 a.m. and 8 p.m. ET Monday through Friday or visit the firm's website at www.angelcarebaby.com to order the free repair kit.
